Well the graphic novel Villains United answers just that question when Lex Luthor recruits hundreds of people to join The Society to get revenge on the heroes of the Justice League of America. Not everyone is thrilled with this as a number of individuals dare to say no to him and become the Secret Six. They are led by the mysterious Mockingbird, who has an agenda all his own. With its many plot twists and edge-of-the-seat action sequences, this story will turn readers into Catman fans, even if they've never heard of him before.

The legend of Drizzt. Book 1, Homeland

Based on R. A Salvatore's novel and adapted to graphic novel format, Homeland tells the beginnings of Drizzt Do'Urden, the prince of a royal house in the Drow city of Menzoberranzan. He will grow to maturity in a land where violence and betrayal are an everyday occurrence in the name of an evil spider goddess. Can a moral man live in an immoral society without it changing him or must he leave to save himself.
