
NJ Black Deaf Advocates





A collection of first-person writing on the joys and challenges of the modern disability experience. The book brings together stories of everyday people whose lives are an ingenious way to live.




UNBOUND: THE LIFE AND ART OF JUDITH SCOTT




HEAR & BEYOND: LIVE SKILLFULLY WITH HEARING LOSS



Hearing loss doesn't come with an operating manual—until now. This book provides a real-life illustration of how hearing loss, its emotions, and its barriers affect every corner of your life.

Lang documents the struggles and strategies over nearly a century to make spoken communication accessible through the use of captioning technology.


THE SIGN FOR HOME




ON BEING HUMAN: A MEMOIR OF WAKING UP, LIVING REAL, AND LISTENING HARD
NON-FICTION; BY JENNIFER PASTILOFF




CODA (2021)


DEAF OUT LOUD (2018)


DEAF UTOPIA
